



Patriarchal Entrenchments and Transformative Possibilities: Men and Masculinities as Sites of Polarizing Struggle

Keynote by Jeff Hearn 19 November 2021, 19.15 Uhr, via Zoom

In this session, I introduce what I see as some important theoretical elements in studying, analyzing and changing men and masculinities. I go on to discuss some of the diverse, and even polarizing, tendencies that affect and construct men and masculinities, and are enacted by men and masculinities. At this historical time, there seem to be profound, contradictory tendencies and forces upon men and masculinities: on one hand, the entrenchment and intensification of patriarchal, anti-feminist politics and practices, as, for example, in far right politics and misogynist organizing online; on the other hand, there are more signs than ever for transformative possibilities, as, for example, in dissatisfaction with narrow work orientations, greater concerns for care, and acknowledgements of vulnerabilities. The contradictions of patriarchal relations are becoming clearer and even more urgent – in science, art, personal everyday life, politics, and globally.

Jeff Hearn has been involved personally, politically, theoretically, policy- and researchwise in questions of men, masculinities, feminism and gender power relations since the late 1970s. He is currently Professor Emeritus, and Research Director at The GODESS (Gender, Organisation, Diversity, Equality and Social Sustainability) Institute at the Hanken School of Economics in Finland, Professor of Sociology at the University of Huddersfield in the UK, and Senior Professor in Gender Studies at the Örebro University in Sweden. Previously he was professor at Manchester and Linköping Universities, Oslo University and at the University of South Africa. He has been involved in many national, Nordic, European and international projects, with a special interest in South Africa, on gender, sexuality, violence, age, work, care, organizations, policy and transnational processes. He is co-managing editor of *Routledge Advances in Feminist Studies and Intersectionality* book series, co-editor, of *NORMA: The International Journal for Masculinity Studies;* and was co-chair of RINGS: International Research Association of Institutions



of Advanced Gender Studies, 2014-2020. His recent books include *Men of the world: Genders, globalizations, transnational times*, Sage, 2015; *Revenge pornography: Gender, sexuality and motivations*, with Matthew Hall, Routledge, 2017; *Engaging youth in activism, research and pedagogical praxis: transnational and intersectional perspectives on gender, sex, and race,* co-edited with Tamara Shefer, Kopano Ratele and Floretta Boonzaier, Routledge, 2018; *Unsustainable institutions of men: Transnational dispersed centres, gender power, contradictions,* co-edited with Ernesto Vasquez del Aguila and Marina Hughson, Routledge, 2019; *Does knowledge have a gender?* co-editor, Örebro University Press, 2020. He is currently completing two books: one, with Tamara Shefer, on knowledge, power and young sexualities; the other, with Matthew Hall and Ruth Lewis, on digital gender and sexual violations, both for Routledge.
